

PSEUDACRIS MACULATA (Boreal Chorus Frog). USA: NEBRASKA: THURSTON Co.: agricultural ditch east of 14 Rd, 0.40 rd km N jct NE Hwy 16 (42.12593°N, 96.75980°W; WGS 84). 26 April 2015. Drew R. Davis. Verified by Jessa L. Watters. Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History (OMNH 44881 [DRD 1724], 44882 [DRD 1725]). New county record that fills a gap in the known distribution of this species in Nebraska (Hudson 1942. Nebraska Conserv. Bull. 24:1–146; Ballinger et al. 2010. Amphibians and Reptiles of Nebraska. Rusty Lizard Press, Oro Valley, Arizona. 400 pp.; Fogell 2010. A Field Guide to the Amphibians and Reptiles of Nebraska. University of Nebraska–Lincoln, Lincoln, Nebraska. 158 pp.). It is known from surrounding counties in Nebraska (Burt, Cuming, Dakota, and Dixon; Ballinger et al. 2010, *op. cit.*; Fogell 2010, *op. cit.*) and Iowa (Monona, Woodbury; LeClere 2013. A Field Guide to the Amphibians and Reptiles of Iowa. ECO Herpetological Publishing & Distribution, Rodeo, New Mexico. 349 pp.). The nearest known locality for this species is ca. 22.2 km to the south from Beemer, Cuming Co., Nebraska (University of Nebraska State Museum [UNSM] 4757–4761). Adult male (OMNH 44881; 1.73 g; 33 mm SVL) and adult female (OMNH 44882; 1.41 g; 30 mm SVL) collected at 0030 h in a shallow ditch running through an agricultural field. Submerged corn leaves, stalks, and husks were used as a perching surface for these individuals. Additional males were heard calling in this area but not collected. Specimens were collected under a Nebraska Game and Parks Commission Scientific and Educational Permit (#545) issued to DRD.
